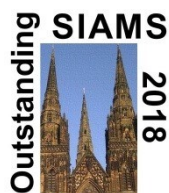

During the term the following objectives will be covered:

Prime Areas



Communication and Language

- Enjoys listening to longer stories and can remember much of what happens.
- Uses a wider range of vocabulary.
- Understand 'why' questions, like: "Why do you think the caterpillar got so fat?"
- Sings a large repertoire of songs.
- Knows many rhymes, be able to talk about familiar books, and be able to tell a long story.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- Select and use activities and resources, with help when needed. This helps them to achieve a goal they have chosen, or one which is suggested to them.
- Show more confidence in new social situations.
- Play with one or more other children, extending and elaborating play ideas.
- Increasingly follow rules, understanding why they are important.

Physical Development

- Continue to develop their movement, balancing, riding (scooters, trikes and bikes) and ball skills.
- Go up steps and stairs, or climb up apparatus, using alternate feet.
- Skip, hop, stand on one leg and hold a pose for a game like musical statues.
- Use large-muscle movements to wave flags and streamers, paint and make marks.
- Match their developing physical skills to tasks and activities in the setting. For example, they decide whether to crawl, walk or run across a plank, depending on its length and width.
- Use one-handed tools and equipment, for example, making snips in paper with scissors.
- Use a comfortable grip with good control when holding pens and pencils.
- Start to eat independently and learning how to use a knife and fork.
- Show a preference for a dominant hand.

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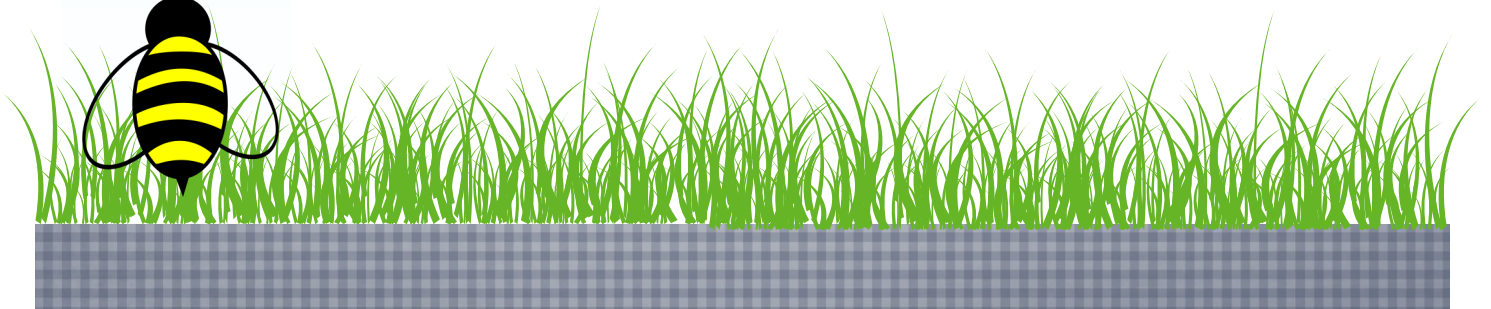
Literacy

- Engage in extended conversations about stories, learning new vocabulary.
- Develop their phonological awareness, so that they can:
 - spot and suggest rhymes
 - count or clap syllables in a word
 - recognise words with the same initial sound, such as money and mother

Mathematical Development

Specific Areas

- Fast recognition of up to 3 objects, without having to count them individually ('subitising').
- Recite numbers past 5.
- Say one number for each item in order: 1,2,3,4,5.
- Know that the last number reached when counting a small set of objects tells you how many there are in total ('cardinal principle').
- Show 'finger numbers' up to 5.
- Link numerals and amounts: for example, showing the right number of objects to match the numeral, up to 5.
- Experiment with their own symbols and marks as well as numerals.
- Solve real world mathematical problems with numbers up to 5.

Autumn Term First Half

Why am I Marvellous?

To explore this question we will be finding out about what makes us special including our facial characteristics. We will also explore our personality traits which link closely to our Christian school values.
